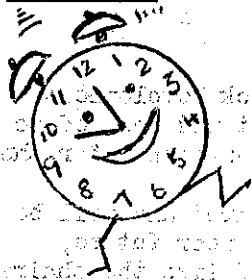
## ON CALL

## FOR CHARITY

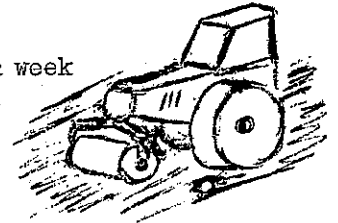
The car left behind by Mr. Frank Wojick has been sold for £150. The money will go to the Community Care Council.

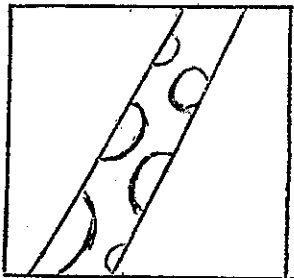

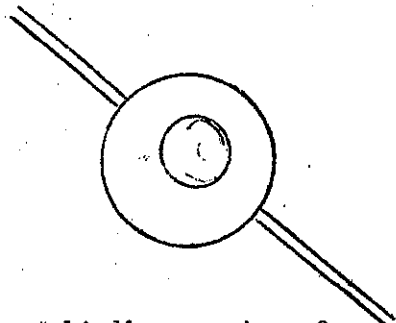

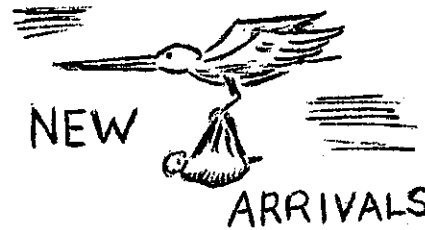
## HALLOWEEN PARTY

Attclogh Quarries - A big development programme is under way here with the European market in view. The Quarry jointly run by Enda Cunningham and a subsidiary of Sisk is looking for 20 new

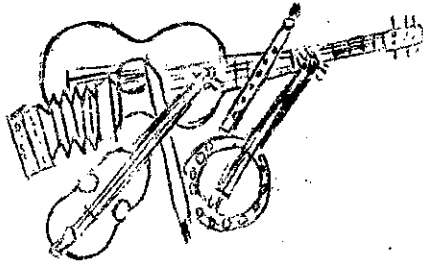

We extend a big welcome to the new caretaker who has taken up his position at the school - Paddy McBrearty. We hope his job will be made pleasant by all the students.

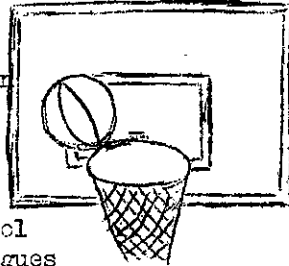


## THE BIG DEBATE
