700 FT Drop Victim Survives

An elderly French woman who fell 700 FT off Sliabh League has miraculously survived her terrifying ordeal.

The woman Madame Marie Helene Fournier (62) from Paris was alone with eight other tourists when she plunged 700 FT down onto a narrow ledge 1,200 FT above sea level.

The Killybegs marine emergency service performed "its most difficult rescue yet "when the tourists got trapped in heavy fog.

The Rescue team rescued the eight tourists within an hour of arriving and brought down the mountain some of them suffering form hypothermia and received hospital treatment.

After confirmation that the woman was still alive, two of the twelve strong rescue team began the perilous decent down the cliff face to rescue her. She was strapped to a stretcher and was losing consciousness. She was brought to Sligo hospital by a helicopter from Finner camp. The pilot has been praised for his skill and nerve in landing in such dangerous conditions.

Madame Fornier who suffered a fractured skull and injuries to her arm and leg is still in a "stable condition" in Sligo hospital.



FREE LABOUR

In the building of the church, nothing second-hand would suffice for him and he overlooked nothing. Practically all the unskilled labour was given free by the parishioners. Entire townlands formed relays in digging the foundations, quarrying the building stone, and burning limestone, and woe betide the skirker who attempted to shirk his share of the toil.

Some of the ornamented cut stone came from the famous Drimkeelin quarry, then at the heyday of its prosperity.

The roof pillars with their capitals, stone mullions for the windows and other items are mainly from Drumkeelin, near Mountcharles, but in shade or texture, differ very little from the local stone.

The roof timbers were pitch pine and the slates came from Killaloe in Clare.

A wooden altar, taken from the old church, stands in the rear sacristy, a fine example of the woodcarver's art.

Some of the present appointments were later gifts. A marble reredos with a representation of the evangelists in mosaic is behind the high altar, while under it is a splendid Carrera marble representing the burial of Christ.

The great window behind the altar was donated by the Canon to the memory of his friend, Cardinal O'Donnell.

There are many memorial windows in stained glass depicting scriptural subjects.

Another priest who contributed much towards the work of building was Father Eddie Doherty, who later joined the Maynooth Mission to China.

He travelled much in the United States and his collection from emigrants there made up a big part of the cost.

It was a red-letter day for the parish when Dr. O'Donnell, later Cardinal, Bishop of Raphoe, came to the opening and Solemn Dedication of the Church.

Many improvements have been carried out at the church, such as a new entrance, a tiled floor, central heating, and a Going through the records of those days, some of the prices make interesting reading. A workman's wages was 10½p per day, carters got 25p per day; a new crowbar cost 2½p; a shovel was 6p and a handbarrow cost 25p!

The total cash cost of the church was £4,980.46!!

Old Irish

T OLD Irish wakes, windows and doors were left open, to let the spirit of the dead depart.

In Co. Sligo, as soon as the breath had left a sick person, the bed was carried out. If there was high ground near the house, it was burned there.

Just before the moment of death, the sick person was laid on the floor. This was believed to ease the escaping spirit.

Then two people were sent out to tell the news of the death.

Livestock, as well as neighbours, were informed. When the body was washed and laid out, a plate containing tobacco or salt was placed on the corpse.

Old Irish wakes were important social occasions. 'More matches were made at wakes than at weddings', remarked Maria Edgeworth.

Wake games were played. Directed by a man known as 'The Borekeen', they included riddles, jokes, singing, dancing - and even wrestling.

These were usually reserved for the death of an old person, who had enjoyed the normal span of life.

Any snuff left over from the wake was carefully collected. It was believed to have curative properties. And those who followed the hearse to the graveside always carried a piece of salt to protect them from



Cairdeas na bhFidleiri has announced the details of the 1998 Summer School. It



On Saturday night August 8th the Italian-based band, Birkin Tree will perform in the Tea House at the Folk Village. Birkin Tree play traditional Irish music to an excellent standard as well as ethnic European music.







The old black shawl

The older people of Kilcar will remember how the shawl was worn by most women, young and old, sixty years ago. Indeed in the thirties and in the early forties, the shawl was still worn by many of the older women in South West Donegal.

Unlike the multi-coloured garment worn by the gypsies and by women in the West of Ireland, the Kilcar shawl was always black in colour. It had many uses apart from being a very warm woollen wrap, which kept out the cold and retained the body heat. It was often thrown over the cradle in order to keep the baby cosy and warm or it might be seen hung over the dresser in the bottom of the large coutnry kitchen while the farmer thrashed the corn on the floor with a flail.

The end of the 1939-45 war brought about the end of austerity in clothing, and new synthetic fibres became easy to procure and new materials came on the market. Women, with a new freedom in selection, design and variety in clothing began to try out new fashions. The days of the black shawl were numbered. They disappeared, one by one, until it was worn only by a single soul

in Kilcar.

Maggie O'Donnell lived in a cosy thatched cottage on her little farm adjacent to Leitir Bridge which spans the Glenaddra river. She worked hard on her wee bit of land but she was always a happy lady who could take a part in any kind of work. Indeed it was said that she could throw a loop better than any man on a salmon or white trout in the pool at the bottom of the field. But she never forgot to attend her religious duties and she never missed Mass or evening Devotions in the Church. We can recall how she strolled up the aisle at her ease, her eyes fixed on the altar, and her black shawl wrapped around her as she moved to a forward, seat.

On the 17th of January 1978 she died after having spent over four score years in her natvie Kilcar.

For today I think she somehow knew




