

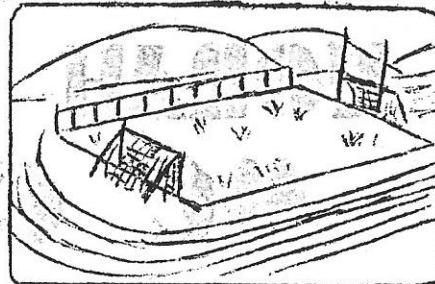

PROGRESS ON NEW SPORTSGROUND FOR CARRICK

For some years now a group of enthusiastic people from the Carrick area have been holding meetings, collecting money through bazaars, silver circles etc., and drawing up plans with the one aim of providing the Carrick people with a proper sportsground. Now the committee have submitted their plans to Roinn na Gaeltachta for approval for a grant and are expecting a reply within the next two months.

The committee consists of:

set out to collect enough
money to begin the work.



They organized bazaars, held silver circles and participated in organizing the carnival with the Development Committee. The committee have gathered about £2,500 and hope to add another £1000 or so to that over the next few months. With a grant from Roinn na Gaeltachta the committee hope to have enough money to complete the project.

The committee had a plan for the new pitch drawn up and this was put out for tender. The plans make provision for an excellent and well-appointed sportsground which will be well-drained and fenced. Mr. O'raghallaigh of Roinn na

Gaeltachta has studied the project and was very pleased with the organisation and effort which went into it. He will recommend the scheme to the Department and is quite hopeful that the plans will be passed quickly.

The committee has a valuable link to the old Carrick Sportsground Committee in John Moloey who has been a mentor and adviser to the new committee since its inception. The group like to think that, although their plans are for a spanking new pitch which will be well-designed, they are continuing on the work which was begun in Carrick many years ago when the land was purchased on the Line Road by local people and made into a playing pitch. Although that pitch has deteriorated into bogland the new committee are determined that their new project will be properly looked after. "The setting up of the grounds is only the first stage", said a committee member, "but this committee will continue on to supervise the grounds and ensure they are properly maintained."

The contract will be undertaken by a local landscaper so the money that the committee has gathered will remain in the area. Work may begin in the summer.

PIPED T.V. SCHEME FOR CARRICK

It was suggested at the Development Committee meeting in Carrick in January that the question of piped television for the village should be investigated. Following this suggestion by Jim Cunningham, the Committee Chairman, Brian McAuley met Rory Connellan, chief engineer of RTE in the Northwest and reported back to the committee at their meeting on the 1st of February. The Development Committee then set up a sub-committee to develop the scheme and investigate whether it would be viable to install this service in the village.

What is 'piped television'? What is involved, basically is that a special aerial with boosters and amplifiers is put up on a site with the best reception in the area and a cable is taken from the aerial to each individual house so that each house can get the best picture that is available about.

Firstly the people involved in the scheme will have to find where the best signal is. Already Macra na Tuaithe have begun a survey to find out what kind of picture people are getting. When the area with the best picture is discovered a portable T.V. will be used to find the exact site where the aerial is to be placed.

Then the people in the village must be canvassed to find out how many are prepared to join the scheme. If enough people join the project can go ahead and a co-operative will be formed. This is done

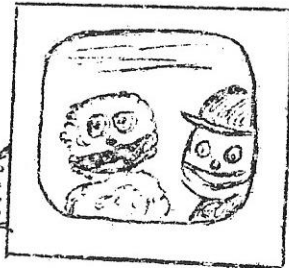
so that the equipment can be bought free from VAT. Mr. Rory Connellan will design the aerial and will meet the local people to discuss the whole idea. He will examine the site and make suggestions and show how the work is to be done.

The cost of the project at the moment would be roughly £50 per house but this depends on many factors - the aerial, how much cable is to be used, how many people join the scheme.

Of course the T.V. signals will have to be investigated but it looks at present that only two channels will be available - RTE in colour or Black and White and BBC in black and white. Poor reception of UTV might also be available.

The reason for the above channels is that we receive our signal from Brougher Mountain near Enniskillen and it only sends out a Black and White signal on 405 lines. It was to be changed some years ago but the technicians doing the work were killed by a landmine and the work stopped. However, the BBC have started again and in 1979 Brougher Mountain will be sending out a UHF signal in colour for BBC 1, BBC 2 and UTV all of which should be available here by then. The cost of buying a private aerial to receive the above stations in 1979 will be about £100, but of course, those in the "Piped T.V. Co-operative" will have their reception for much less.

Why not wait until 1979 then? Well, the cost of materials is increasing all the time and also some people will have to change or adjust their aerials for RTE reception in 6 months due to the changeover of the Truskmore transmitter to 625 lines only. As well as that Mr. Connellan agreed that the RTE reception in Carrick Main Street, particularly it is very bad indeed. If enough interest is shown by local people in the idea the village should have trouble-free T.V. reception within a reasonably short time.



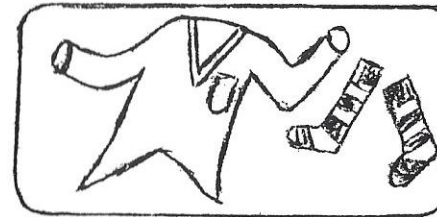

CARRICK DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE NOTES

A meeting of Carrick Development Committee took place on Tuesday 1st February in the Vocational School. Proinsias Carr of Roxborough was welcomed on to the committee - he takes the place of the late Padraig O'Byrne as he was next on the list from the elections.

The Chairman Brian McAuley read correspondence and in answer to Hugh Cunningham's request for an extension to the bin collection route in the village the Council had pointed out that contracts had been made for this year and the extension would be requested for next year.

The Donegal County Council has put Development at Port-a-Chabhlaigh beach on their amenity priority list but it seems that nothing will be done by the Council at the site this year. The Committee will have to make alternative plans if they wish to see development there this year.

A sub-committee was organised to implement the Scéin Forbartha Pobal and to contact local associations to take part.

Carrick will be entered for the Tidy Towns Competition and a sub-committee will be organised for this when the competition begins.

A report was made on developments on a community centre and there has been no material progress to date.

A sub-committee was organised to look after social events and they will meet representatives of the Sportsground Committee to make arrangements for a carnival. They will also

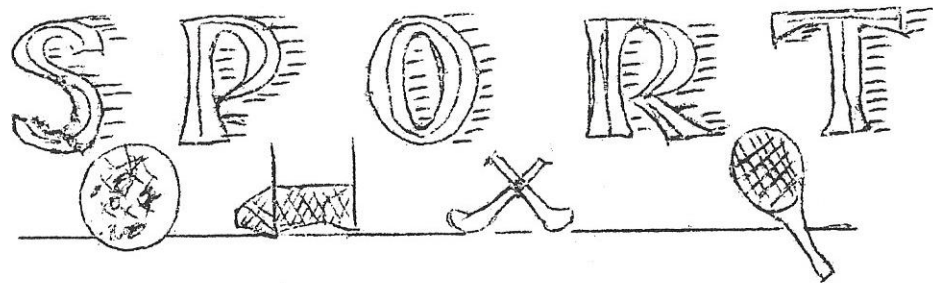
FOR CATHAL FROM HIS FRIENDS IN KILCAR

At the meeting of the 10th February Colin Bowman acted as secretary in the absence of Elaine Cunningham.

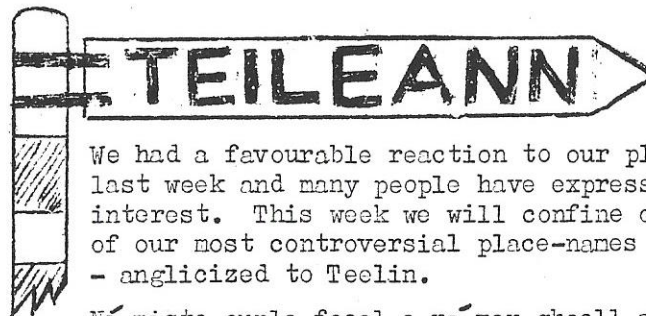
CANDLE MAKING PROJECT

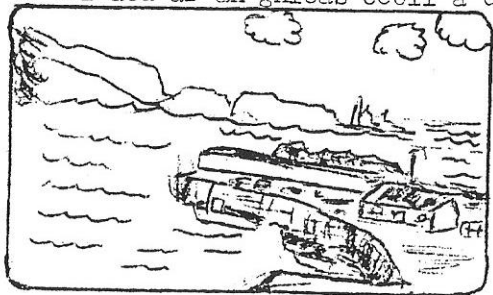

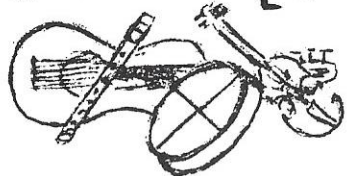

Toghadh fo-choiste de Choiste Forbartha na Carrige ag an chruinniú deireannach chun Sceim Forbartha Pobal, Gaeltarra Éireann a ionratháil sa cheanntar. Seard ta i gceist anseo eolas faoi thionsclaíocht, iascaireacht, cursaí soisialta 7rl a chur ar fáil agus ansin an dul-chun-cinn atá déanta ag an phobal a thaispeáint ag deireadh na bliana.

Gan anhras ní nór do gach duine sa cheanntar bheith páirteach sa sceim agus mar sin tionólfar cruinniú go luath chun an sceim a phlé le heagrais eagsúla agus leis an pobal i gcoiteann.

Ta duaiseanna móra ag dul don chomórtas - £6000 an chéad duais - agus ilionad duaiseanna do ranna speisialta eile. Is dóigh go roinnfí an duais ar na heagrais eagsúla da mbainfí é ach iad a bheith páirteach sa sceim. Beidh obair áirithe ag baint leis an sceim seo - o thaobh staitisticí a bhailiú agus ta suil again go mbeidh seo ar fáil go toilteanach ó mhuintir na haite.

A meeting will be called shortly to enter the area in the Gaeltarra Eireann, Gaeltacht Community Scheme. A sub-committee of the Carrick Development Committee was set up at the last meeting for this purpose and they will seek the aid of the people in the area in fostering community economic and cultural development in the district over the year. The competition covers every facet of life in the community and generous prizes are awarded to the community that the adjudicators judge to be the most deserving. The competition is adjudicated by questionnaires and by visits of Gaeltarra representatives to the community to see what is taking place. The first prize is £6000 and it will be up to the committee to decide what is to be done with the money if it were won.

We hope local committees and voluntary associations will help out in the filling in of the questionnaires.
