
ANCO COURSE

23 young people are presently doing an ANCO course in Carrick Vocational School. They are all finished with secondary school, most having done the Leaving Certificate or finished a secretarial course. For the first week of the course Charlie McGarvey instructed on Industrial Psychology and Trade Union Practice. The following two weeks Brian McAuley will give a course on company structure, organisation, work study. quality control and seni-state bodies. The students will visit factories in the area and the ANCO centre in Gweedore. They will be given talks by businessmen and managers. Patricia Murrin will give a two-week course on Office Practice, Income Tax, filing procedures etc. The final week of the six week course will be given by Charlie McGarvey. The students receive £3 per day for attending the course and have a card stamped. The general feeling is that the course is well worth while and they would like to see it incorporated in the school syllabus.



\$10 LADY

In 1907 Mary Cunningham of Lower Carrick was in the employment of the world famous artist St. Gaudens near Boston, Mass. U.S.A. She was 22 years of age. At this time St. Gaudens got his most important ever commission - to sketch the images to appear on a new series of \$ 10 gold coins.

St. Gaudens, naturally, consulted many of his artist friends on what sort of woman should appear on the coins. It was agreed by all that she should have the beautiful lines of the ideal feminiae face such as is found in Praxiteles' "Aphrodite". The image on the coin was meant to represent the Goddess of Liberty.

Finally, St. Gaudens decided that the face of Mary

Cunningham, of all those he had had ever seen came closest to the ideal femining beauty and so he decided that her face was the one which should appear on the coins.

An interesting footnote is that St. Gaudens and the intellectual savants who surrounded him were atheists or agnostics who frequently and heatedly argued against religion. But on his deathbed St. Gaudens became a Catholic and it is well known that under God it was Mary Cunningham who was responsible for the change of heart. Although famous Marv led a simple life and never again posed for an artist. You can see the story in the

papers of the period at the historical exhibition.






GLEN SCENES

We continue extracts from the Book by Arnold Bax - "Farewell, My Youth", which was published in 1943

I like to fancy that on my deathbed my last vision in this life will be the scene from my window on the upper floor at Glencolumbkille, of the still brooding, dove-grey mystery of the Atlantic at twilight; the last glow of sunset behind

Glen Head in the north; with its ruined watch-tower built in 1812 at the time of the scare of a Napoleonic invasion; and east of it the calm slope of Scraig Beefan, its glittering many coloured surface of rock, bracken and heather, now one uniform, purple glow.



In winter I would often linger at that window, too fascinated in watching the implacable fury of that same Atlantic in a south-westerly storm to sit down to work. At one end of the little Glen Bay was a wilderness of tumbled black rocks, for some reason named "Romatia", and upon this grim escarpment the hreakers thundered and crashed...

There were days when you had to lean hard up against the wind to keep your feet at all and I have known stout Peggy to be actually bowled willy-nilly into the ditch at the side of the road.

Scattered through the Glen are many curious upright stones, some of them incised with Celtic designs, and known as crosses. They are indeed used on June 9th, St. Columcille's birthday, for the barefooted performance of the Stations of the Cross, but I have no doubt that they are prehistoric phallic emblems and figured originally in some dark sexual rite.

I am not a scientist, so do not know whether the fact that there is no land between the Donegal coast and the polar ice has anything to do with the dramatic atmospheric and neteorological effects that one sometimes witnessed there.

Thart fán bhliain 1746 bhí sagart anháin agus bráthair ag cuidiú leis an Bráthair Bán. Ní raibh aon scoil sa pharóiste gidh go raibh i gCill Charthaigh. Is thart fan an seo bhí an tAthair Mac Giolla Cearr sa pharóiste. Tháinig airteagal air go Malainn Bhig agus nuair a bhí se ar a bhealach amach an aithghiorra go Teileann, tháinig se ar mhairnealach leathbháite ar chúl Sliabh Liag. Is cosúil go raibh an duine bocht tar éis bheith i Mexico ar thóir an óir agus é ag filleadh ar ais lena shaibhreas nuair a bhuail an bad ar bhuilg agus cailleadh í agus iomlán dá raibh ar bord. 
MICHAEL BYRNE, WEAVER.

On the left as you come in the Line Road to Carrick there is a sign: "Hand loom at work - 100 yards". If you go down to the little building marked with the sign "hand loom" Micheal Byrne will be glad to show you his hand loom ir ction.

The tradition was handed down to Michael fron his father, Frank who was a weaver in Kilcar factory. His father's loom could only weave a width of 30 inches but with his double-width loom Michael can weave a web of 56 inches which may be 20 to 30 yards long.

Before he starts weaving proper Michael has to put in about 6 hours preparation. He takes the yarn from the bobbins on to the warping bar — "warping" — which takes about 2 hours. Then he takes them from the warping bar on to a big beam at the back of the loom. The threads are then taken through — eyes on four pedals. The threads are then brought through the "reed" and the warp is completed. The warp consists of about 1000 threads. Then the shuttles have to be loaded. There are 3 shuttles and a different colour of thread can be used in each. The threads going across the warp are called the weft. When weaving the shuttle shoots over and back putting the threads of the weft across between the threads in the warp in a process using both hands and also both feet on foot pedals.

There are many different types of tweed that Michael makes Herring Bone, Straight Twill,
Broken twill, Hound's Tooth,
Checked and many patterns that have not got specific names. An old traditional type of Donegal tweed (Bainin Brocach) has all white thread in the warp and flecked threads in the weft.
Michael gets all his weaving



thread from the factory in Kilcar. He send some tweed to America

and also gets orders from a big number of passing tourists. Some tourists come to see the loom at work, others to buy tweed. Michael also cuts his tweed into skirt lengths and wraps them in cellophane. An article on Michael's enterprise appeared in the National Geographic magazine some years ago. Nar laga Dia a laimh...



Blackcurrants are now in season. This fruit is one of our best sources of Vitamin C which is vital for our well-being. The following are two practical uses for Blackcurrants:

BLACKCURRANT JAM - (yield 10 lbs).

4 lbs. of Blackcurrants

6 lbs. sugar

3 pts. water.

Remove the stems, wash the fruit. Put the fruit and the water

into a scucepan and sinner gently until the fruit is tender (about ½to¾ hr.). Stir frequently to prevent burning. Add the sugar Stir until the sugar is dissolved Boil rapidly until setting point is reached. Gooseberry jan is made in the same way.

Blackberries and gooseberries make delicious pies and tarts. 8 oz. Shortcrust Pastery: 8ozs. flour; 4 ozs. margarine; pinch of salt; 2 tblsp. cold water.

Filling:

1½ lbs. B'currents or gooseberries.

4 ozs. sugar.

 $\frac{1}{4}$ pint of water.


