A meeting of Carrick Development Committee was held in the Vocational School, Carrick on the first Tuesday in October.

The secretary read a letter which she had written to Mr. Jim White, T.D. expressing concern about the hold-up in the new buildings for Carrick Vocational School. The letter was approved by the committee.

In the matter of the community centre' proposed for the Line Road, Carrick it was decided to apply to the County Council for planning permission for the site.

An interim report was given on the finances of the Carnival and the profit estimate at that point with some bills outstanding was about $\pounds 2,000$.

There was a long discussion on the upcoming elections for a new committee which are due to take place in November/December. Some alternatives were suggested like having smaller committees for each area like Meenaneary, Teelin etc. and having a small committee for Carrick village. The general feeling of the committee was, however, that there should be a certain number of delegates elected from each district to a central committee.

It was felt that the committee's image needed to be projected properly in the community. The idea was expressed that people regarded the committee as not being very important and achieving very little. On the contrary, the secretary pointed out that the committee did some very important work, a case in point being a visit she received from Board of Works personnel some time ago who wished to examine Aghera Pier and who had the committee's letter on that subject with them. It was decided

to elect a P.R.O. for the committee and Francis Walsh was appointed.

The question of pipedT.V. was brought up and it was decided to leave the question until the

results of some tests were known.

The following Saturday was set aside for the dismantling and storing of the Marquee in Carrick and the Glen Football Club and Meenaneary Community Committee were to be contacted to help out as they had promised when they had received the use of the marquee during the summer.

The committee passed a vote of thanks to the Carrick Sportsground Committee, their partner in the running of the Carnival who had voted that all the proceeds of the Carnival should go to the

Development Committee.

T.V. CHANGE

There has been some excited talk of the change by BBC and UTV to a new transmitter at Enniskillen and the possibilities of obtaining BBC 1, BBC 2 and UTV programmes in colour.

The new transmitter is at Brogher Mountain in Enniskillen and is transmitting to a radius of 20 miles in UHF. This type of transmission is 'line of sight' and with the mountains between us and Enniskillen our chances of receiving any type of strong signal are not good. And so it has proved. Some testing done in the area has not been very positive with the exception of Largy where a perfect signal has been obtained. Reasonable reception is also available in some areas of Teelin where some people are presently enjoying their five stations.

Kilcar have been investigating the possibilities of a communal aerial and piped television. A meeting has been held and a survey is presently in progress with the view of finding out how many people would be interested in taking the programmes and joining in the scheme.

There has been no movement in Carrick as of yet to form a group to set up piped television. co-operative.

This Cup was presented to the Glencolumbkille Branch of the National Graves Association by the Derry Journal Ltd. One of the conditions — stipulated was, that half of the gate rece pts of the final would go towards the tending, the care and protection of the monument erected to perpetuate the memory of Comdt. Donnchadh Mac Niallais, Oglaigh na Heireann, and hnour his services to the

cause of Irish freedom. Comdt. Mac Niallais served in Cork and Dønegal during the entire period of the struggle. As a matter of interest he dodged the British hangman and his rope by escaping from Cork gaol on the 11th November 1918 - Armistice Day.

Fhe first two teams to compete for the Mac Niallais Memorial Cup were Sean Mac Cumhaills, the then County Champions and Kilcar. There was no senior team in Clencolumbkille Parish at that time. The game was played on Sunday August 2nd 1964 and Kilcar won the cup. This annual game with the County Champions is now a standard fixture on the County Board programme since the Divisional Boards ceased to function. Thanks are due to the County Board official, Francis Cunningham, U.S., whose efforts made it possible for us to have this annual game with the current champions of Tir Chonaill.


